



1. **The organization will not accept posters sent by post mail.**
2. **For each poster at least one of the authors HAS TO be registered and he/she will be responsible of its display in time in the lecture hall.**
3. **Some selected posters will be required to prepare a short presentation/talk of about 5 minutes maximum (with the possibility of showing also 3 slides to the audience). This will be notified soon to authors.**

- We expect you to print the poster yourself and take it. Time will be allowed for poster board before the conference starts (Friday 4th, 2010 **from 8 to 9 am ONLY**) The organization will provide you with push pins or velcro. Members from the organization will be available to help if needed. Timely collection of materials at the end of the conference is author's responsibility.

- Posters should measure 100 x 70 cm. Use the instructions as exactly as possible as shown in the template/layout you will find as an attachments in this e-mail.

- **Posters SHOULD NOT be pre-mounted on any type of board.** For each poster, a board will be provided which measures 1,75 m tall by x 0,80 m feet wide (vertical) The board is elevated on a stand so that the bottom of the board is approximately 50 cm off the ground.

- Make your poster as self-explanatory as possible. Your poster should cover the key points of your work. It needs not attempt to include all the details; The text included in the preprints/proceedings will help complete the information you want to provide. The ideal poster is designed to attract attention, provide a brief overview of your work, and initiate discussion.

- The flow of your poster should be from the top left to the bottom right

- The title of your poster should appear at the top in large letters. Poster titles using a font size of 60 point will stand out and be easy to read. The minimum font size for poster titles should be 36 point.

- Below the title you may wish to put the author(s)' name(s), affiliation(s) and contact email(s)

- People will not read a lot of text, and certainly won't read standard journal-sized text. Try to use an easy-to-read font and keep the font size of important points to 24 - 40 point if possible. The smallest text on your poster should be at least 18 point.

- Try to state your main result in large lettering. This way people can read the poster from a distance. Studies show that text written in all capital letters is hard to follow; it is better to use bold print than all caps, though you are then limited on making those bold-type statements that will stand out from the rest of your text.

- When laying out your poster leave breathing space around you text. Don't overcrowd your poster.

- Try using pictures, diagrams, cartoons, figures or coloured graphs rather than text wherever possible. Avoid long numerical tables. Use of color in your graphics will enhance your poster. Colors will help you highlight and make your poster much more attractive.

- It is recommended that pictures are 10x15 cm and 300 ppp minimum to guarantee legibility.
